

References and Citations for the *Journal of Economics and Econometrics*

The reference list, headed '**References**', should appear at the end of the article, and should include details of all the sources of information which have been referred to, or cited, in the text.

Citations in the manuscript should follow the following format: "Tomphson (1994) showed that..." or "This methodology was extensively used (e.g., Han et al., 1970; Tomphson 1994; Smith, Tomphson and Han 2000)". Do not use et al. in the reference section. When citing works in text, use et al. only when a work has four or more authors.
